 - PERFECT TIMING! Immediately following our Garage Sale
 - Your chance to de-clutter, organize, and donate!
 - Residents may place unlimited items at the curb for collection.
 - Typical discarded items include toys, old clothes, couches, beds, dressers, grills, and patio furniture.
 - Items PROHIBITED from FREE Spring Clean-up collection:
 - Household garbage normally put out for weekly collection that requires a sticker, automobile parts, yard waste, white goods, appliances, air conditioners, household hazardous waste, electronics, and construction and demolition materials.
- FREE leaf and brush collection April 11-Apr. 26
 - Leaves must be placed in standard paper yard waste bags or reusable containers that are clearly marked with a red "X". Brush must be tied in 4 ft. lengths.
 - Grass clippings and other yard waste will still require a collection sticker.
 - Normal Groot weekly trash pick up on Thursdays all month. Stickers required.

"April" takes its name from the Latin word "aperire", meaning "to open:" (Just like flowers do in spring!)









- Hummingbirds usually begin to arrive in our area in mid April!
- Attract and feed hummingbirds, either by planting flowers they love or providing a feeder with nectar.
 - Flowers Hummingbirds Love:
 - Fuchsia
 - Petunias
 - Hosta
 - Honeysuckle
 - Daylilies (click above for MORE!)

Feeders:

- If using a feeder with either homemade nectar or nectar you have purchased, PLEASE remember to change the nectar and clean the feeder every 2 days as old nectar may grow mold and poison the birds, especially in warm weather!
- Homemade Nectar Recipe for feeders:
 - Mix 1c. Sugar and 4c. Water until disolved.
 - DO NOT add red dye.
 - For storage, refrigerate any extra sugar water.
- Hummingbird Fun Facts
 - $\circ\;$ Hummingbirds are the only birds that can fly backwards.
 - Hummingbirds migrate as much as 3000 miles in one direction from Canada to Mexico.
 - The average weight of a hummingbird is less than a nickel.
 - Hummingbirds beat their wings 70 times per second. that's 4000 beats per minute!
 - Hummingbirds are the worlds smallest migrating bird
 - $\circ\,$ Hummingbirds can only use their feet and legs for perching. They cannot hop or walk.
 - Hummingbirds live 3 to 5 years.
 - ∘ Hummingbirds hearts beat as many as 1290 times/minute. •







Our beloved pets and good predators which live off of rodents may be easily and inadvertently POISONED and DIE due to use of RODENTICIDES (Rodent POISON), either in the home or outdoors.

- Mice, rats, squirrels, chipmunks, voles, moles, ground squirrels, and more are common rodents in Illinois. They can be entertaining and cute, but are sometimes destructive to homes, vehicles, and landscaping.
- Placing rodenticides (rodent poison), either inside or outside of your home, may seem like a good solution to a rodent problem, but is often a deadly threat to pets, birds of prey such as owls, hawks and local bald eagles, foxes, coyotes, and other helpful apex predators which naturally control rodent populations!
 - A pet, bird of prey, or any wild animal may be poisoned by:
 - Directly consuming poison meant for rodents.
 - Consuming a rodent which has eaten poison.
 - Signs of poisoning:
 - Vomiting, diarrhea, seizures, lethargy, abnormal heart rhythm, high temperature or blood pressure or dehydration.
 - If your pet shows these signs, seek immediate veterinary attention.
 - Should you see a wild animal or bird of prey exhibiting symptoms of poisoning, contact a local rescue organization such as Flint Creek Wildlife Rehabilitation for guidance and assistance.
- Safer methods of rodent control:
 - Check out this detailed article addressing safe Rodent Control Strategies
 - Be aware that bird feeders attract rodents.
 - Numerous natural scented plants or products can be strategically placed to repel rodents. (Note: Chopped up chunks of Irish Spring soap repels them!)
 - Plants which repel rodents:
 - Marigolds, mint, rosemary, catnip, daffodils, chrysanthemums, onions, basil, hyacinth, sage, lavender, and more!
 - If traps are used, be sure to check them frequently.
 - Electronic or "zap traps", live traps such as a "tin cat",
 - o Avoid snap traps for outdoor use as they are potential threats to other animals and birds.
 - HavaHeart offers repellants and live traps for release and re-location.

Now is the Time...To Fertilize

PEONIES-The most important time to fertilize your peonies is right before or just as the bush is beginning to break through the ground in very early spring. They are breaking through **now**. **ROSES**-See a picture of my favorite Rose product below which works and saves lots of time, Bayer Rose and Flower Care.

EASIEST...

- Stop feeding the birds (store feeders till next year)
- Flush street side plantings (Flush the planting beds near the street with plenty of water to dilute the road salt that has accumulated in the soil.)
- Put out stored yard decorations & a rain gauge (helps to gauge when and how much to water)
- Tune up the mower (Make an appointment, beat the rush)
- Apply Preen (reduces weeds in beds)
- Fertilize and Aerate the lawn (hire someone)

A LITTLE MORE WORK...by Order of Importance

- Clean up perennial grass (cut to 3-4 inches)
- <u>Rejuvenation Pruning shrubs</u> (Cut all branches off of gangly, ugly deciduous shrub, off to 6 inches from the ground.) Good candidates: flowering spirea, potentilla, overgrown lilac, dogwood, privet, honeysuckles and forsythia (most lilacs rejuvenated by this method will not bloom for two to three years.)

- Prune roses (helps promote blooms, prevent disease & pest damage)
- Prune other shrubs (Lilacs should be only be pruned after blooming)
- Divide perennials (share with friends and neighbors, sell at garage sale)
- Clean & Sharpen Tools (save task for a rainy day)
