




# **>>>** As there are few dates of note in August, how about a little **August Trivia?**



- Early July through Mid August
  - The "Dog Days" of Summer
  - o Ancient Romans and Greeks noted that , "Sirius", or "The Dog Star", rose in conjunction with the Sun between July 3 and August 11; the hottest time of the year.
  - o "Sirius" is a star in the constellation, "Canus Major", and is named after the largest of Orion's 2 dogs, "Sirius" and "Procyon".
    - The "Dog Days of Summer" were thought to be times of lethargy, disease, drought, misfortune, and MAD DOGS! Let us hope not!

## Perseid Meteor Shower

- Peaks August 11-12 from midnight through dawn
  - A perfect time to make a wish upon on a "shooting star"!
- Mt. Vesuvius erupted on August 24, 79 AD.
  - Pompeii was covered in 7 ft. of lava and volcanic ash.
  - o Approx. 1/3 of Pompeii has yet to be excavated. Just imagine what discoveries remain!
- August is named after Roman Emperor, Augustus Caesar.

### INTO THE GARDEN I GO...BY JUDI Z



Deadheading or Removing the Dead Flowers from Your Plants – for Abundant Display of Blooms or Second Blooms

**Roses**-Deadheading roses encourages reblooming by directing it's energy towards new blooms and improves the appearance and shape of the rose.



Knock Out Roses-That's why I picked these popular roses for the Glenmoor front entrance. All members in The Knock Out Family of Roses are self-cleaning, so there is no need to deadhead. I deadhead mine to keep a tidier look.





<u>Salvia</u>-deadheading Salvia improves the appearance of the plant. The image on the left shows an untrimmed Salvia plant. The rebloom is not significant. Peonies-have a short flowering season in June. Deadheading will not reward you with more blooms this year but focuses the plant's energy on building a strong and healthy root system and helps the overall plant health.



Hostas-come in hundreds of varieties. By this time of year many Hosta have bloomed and mostly have a long stalk left. Deadheading will not reward you with more blooms but removing the stalks helps the beauty of the different textures, and shades of greens and yellows show better. Same applies to Daylilies.

I cut all of the other purple flowered Hosta's stalk off when they first appear. I have a Hosta that has white blooms in August. I don't remove the white flowers as I like the way that they look and I swear they smell like gardenias.

<u>Hosta plantaginea</u>, the fragrant plantain lily or August lily, is native to China. This species and cultivars derived from it are the **only fragrant Hosta**.
